When war was declared he was 1st Lt. ~~of~~ of a volunteer Co. Machine gun Co. in Morrisstown N.J. and helped to quell disturbances among the 300 German sailors interned near there, and helped to round them up for detention camp.

Enlisted April 9, 1917 Elizabeth N.J.
 Sent to Ft. Slocum May 21, 1917
 From there to Ft. Sam Houston Texas to join the 7th F.A.
 Rated Corporal July 21, 1917
 Sailed for France July 25, 1917
 Arrived St. Nazaire Aug. 13, 1917 - the first American Artillery
 Rated Sgt. Sept. 15, 1917. Levi France.

First Artillery School Sammer Ft. Nov. 26, 1917 - Feb. 1918.

On May 17th-1918 near Cantigny, the incident took place for which he was cited for bravery and received the silver citation. The citation reads "displayed meritorious conduct clearly involving great risk of life, during a bombardment of his Battery, by which the ammunition dump was set on fire and four shells exploded. He rushed to the ammunition dump and extinguished the fire, thereby preventing further loss of ammunition and danger to the personnel of the Battery."
