

What Can I Recycle?

Plastic – any bottle or jug

If the plastic bottle has a mouth smaller than the rest of the container, you can recycle it.

CANNOT RECYCLE: butter or margarine tubs, yogurt containers, lotion tubes, plastic hangers, deli containers, pots from the garden

Glass – any bottle or jar

Any color, any size as long as the glass is a bottle or jar.

Remove lids and rinse out the container, OK to leave labels on.

CANNOT RECYCLE: drinking glasses, light bulbs, baking dishes, dinnerware, window glass, broken glass

Metal Cans – all food related metal cans

No need to remove the label but do rinse out the food can.

CANNOT RECYCLE: metal hangers, scrap metal, dirty aluminum foil, non-food related metal, and non-drink related metal

Paper – if you can tear it, you can recycle it

All types of paper and paperboard (i.e. cereal boxes) are recyclable. Paper must be free of metal, plastic, and debris such as food.

CANNOT RECYCLE: bound books, dirty paper plates, napkins, paper soiled with food, foil coated paper, wrapping paper

Cardboard – corrugated cardboard only

Flat cardboard (i.e. cereal boxes) should be recycled as paper

North Sea and Hampton Bays only:

Electronics – anything with a plug or a battery that is NOT an appliance. Includes Computers, Televisions, Small Scale Servers, Computer Peripherals, Small Electronic Equipment (VCRs, DVRs, Portable Digital Music players, DVD Players, Digital Converter Boxes, Cable or Satellite Receivers, Electronic or Video Game Consoles & cell phones
