*As I was in Holyoke, when my call in the draft came, I entered Amherst College as a Student Soldier, under provisions entered into between the colleges and the U.S. Gov't. The time of seven weeks, up until I was discharged was spent studying ~~various~~ various subjects, prescribed by the Government and college and so many hours each day was spent in drilling & rifle practice etc. Had the signing of the armistice been delayed, I would probably have <sup>been</sup> sent to some officers training camp, had I passed the required Gov't and College tests. As it was the S.A.T.C. was disbanded and broken up a few weeks after the Armistice was signed. I received Service Medals from the State of N.Y. and the Village of Southampton and I am a member in good standing of*
