Enlisted in Southampton People Co.
When other members of the Co. enlisted in the Service
Glenn Kelso had a bad cut on his foot and was not
accepted by the Army doctors. After several attempts
he was passed in time to join his Co. and was
with them until his death on the 28th of
Sept. 28, 1918. He was killed in the Hindenburg,
Lichenbousch, Belgium, on a day light raid. He had
volunteered his services that day as the raid
was in our way connected with his work.
He was killed by a sniper and buried at St. Emelie
His Sgt. spoke of him "There never was a more
courageous soldier than Glenn Kelso, always
attending to the duties assigned him. He was
Corporal in my Signal Platoon and I con-
sidered him the best Corporal I had at
that time
