CITATIONS AND LETTERS.

Letter of Commendation from Chief of Field Artillery, 5th Corps, Nov. 17, 1921.

Citation: General Order Co. 26, Par 40, 5th Corps, Nov. 20, 1918.

"Lieut. Col. H. H. Rogers, 2nd Corps Artillery Park, throughout the operations from Nov. 1st, to 11th, in spite of great difficulties delivered to the advancing guns of the 5th corps ample quantities of ammunition. Due to his zeal and the willing response of his men, at no time were any of the batteries, even in the most forward positions in danger of a shortage of ammunition."

Citation: Second French Army, Commanding General, Jan. 2, 1919.

"By order of the G.H.Q. American, the II Corps Artillery Park, commanded by Lieut. Col. Henry H. Rogers, was put at the disposition of the IInd French Army from Sept. 17th to Oct. 18, 1918.

He rendered the greatest service in placing in the depots of the Army the Ammunition destined for the attack of the 1st American Army upon Montfaucon and Stenay. Thanks to his activity and the devotion of the men under his orders, this organization worked night and day under the worst conditions and contributed in a large part to the good functioning of the replacement of ammunition.

Citation: Ministry of War, Republic of France, Order No. 23870 D, dated Oct. 1, 1920.

Cited in Army Orders.

Lieut. Col. Henry H. Rogers of the American Army, commanding the 2nd Corps Artillery Park, placed with his unit at the disposition of the 2nd French Army in September and October 1918, rendered the greatest services in assuring night and day under difficult circumstances the delivery at the Army depots of the ammunition destined for the attack on Montfaucon and Stenay by the 1st American Army. His activity and devotion contributed in large part to the success of the operations.

Award of Distinguished Service Medal: General Orders 47, Section II War Department, Sept. 15, 1921.

Henry H. Rogers, lieutenant colonel, Field Artillery, United States Army. For exceptionally meritorious and distinguished services while commanding the 2nd corps Artillery Park, which operated with the 5th Army Corps. In spite of great difficulties he delivered large quantities of ammunition to the troops, and by his resourcefulness, courage, and leadership he maintained his command in a high state of efficiency and morale, thereby contributing to the success of the operations of the Corps. Residence at appointment, Southampton, L.I., N. Y.
