EMERGENCY DESIGNATION OF SHELLFISH LANDS IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK AS UNCERTIFIED FOR THE HARVEST OF SHELLFISH

Pursuant to the provisions of Subdivisions 13-0307 (1) and (2) and Subdivision 13-0309 (1) of the Environmental Conservation Law and Section 42.17 and 47.4 of Title 6 of the Official Compilation of Codes, Rules and Regulations of the State of New York, and due to the extremely heavy rainfall and extraordinary amounts of stormwater runoff and localized street flooding associated with the rainfall event from October 2, 2022 through October 5, 2022 which may result in conditions causing shellfish to be hazardous for use as food, I, Debra A. Barnes, Chief, Bureau of Shellfisheries of the Department of Environmental Conservation, hereby designate the shellfish lands described below as **UNCERTIFIED effective immediately on October 5, 2022** and continuing until a determination is made that water quality in the affected areas meets the criteria for certified shellfish lands.

Accordingly, it is unlawful to harvest shellfish from the following areas:

- 1. Town of Southold:** All that area of Cutchogue Harbor lying north of a line extending northeast from New Suffolk Point to the northernmost point of land at Horseshoe Cove; and all tributaries of Hog Neck Bay and Little Peconic Bay lying between Nassau Point and Cedar Beach Point.
- 2. Towns of Southampton and East Hampton:** All that area of Sag Harbor Cove including tributaries lying southerly and westerly of the NYS Route 114 Bridge.
- 3. Town of East Hampton:** All that area of Three Mile Harbor, Hog Creek, and Accabonac Harbor including their tributaries.
