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RECISSION OF EMERGENCY DESIGNATION OF SHELLFISH LANDS IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK AS CLOSED FOR THE HARVEST OF CARNIVOROUS GASTROPODS

Pursuant to the provisions of Subdivisions 13-0307 (1) and (2) and Subdivision 13-0309 (1) and Subdivision 13-0330 (6) of the Environmental Conservation Law and Sections 42.17, 47.4 and 50.1 of Title 6 of the Official Compilation of Codes, Rules and Regulations of the State of New York, and based on a determination that marine biotoxins are not present in shellfish at levels which may cause carnivorous gastropods to be hazardous for use as food, I, Debra A. Barnes, Chief, Bureau of Shellfisheries, Division of Marine Resources of the Department of Environmental Conservation, hereby rescind a portion of the designation dated April 12, 2023, which prohibited the harvest of shellfish and carnivorous gastropods from particular underwater lands in Shinnecock Bay. **This order is effective at sunrise on Saturday, May 6, 2023.**


Accordingly, the harvest of shellfish and carnivorous gastropods from the following areas is permitted:

Town of Southampton: All that area of western Shinnecock Bay lying east of the Post Lane Bridge (Quogue) and lying west of a line extending southerly from the southernmost point of land at Pine Neck Point (East Quogue) to the northern terminus of Triton Lane, located on the barrier beach south of Pine Neck Point.

Except, all of the normally uncertified areas, lying within the area described above, remain uncertified for the harvest of shellfish (clams, oysters, mussels and scallops).
